THE WITNESS: I'm going to tell you because I love my daughter. She's a compulsive liar. I cannot have a conversation with her. I never look forward to her calling me, although I love to hear her voice and tell me about the actions of the kids. I can never expect to have a conversation with her unless there's some untruth that's going to be told, unless something is going to be stretched.

We have -- we have taken care of them through a year and a half of both of them having difficult employment situations, me and my wife have, along with Aaron's parents. I know that we've been told -- I know that we've been told many untruths about what we need this money for and what we need that money for.

I'm a very tight individual. I worked 37 years in the grocery business, but we gave it because two grandchildren; and secondarily, two

people that I love, a daughter and a son-in-law, and just hoping we wouldn't get to this point today.

But I've seen that. That's the main objective.

THE COURT: Has this extended beyond this period that you're talking about? Has she been untruthful for a long time?

THE WITNESS: Absolutely.

BY MR. PARSLEY:

Q. Tell me how many years.

A. It's been -- we've had problems with this for five to eight years, something like that and, you know, I even tried to reason with her and tell her, you know, these are the things that we go through in life sometimes as you get -- if I can use the word maybe "popular" in society, and I had a problem with this because I was coaching.

I had a lot of success coaching. I let it get to my head, and the first thing I knew I was representing things stronger than what they should have been represented, and she has -- and I told her. - A. So as soon as she walked in and locked those, I followed in behind, and I got the little key thing. It took a couple of minutes to get through both sets of doors.

It took maybe three or four minutes for her to come to. She was breathing. She had a pulse. I got a cold cloth and rubbed it on her head and tried to get her to come to.

It took three or four minutes maybe.

When she came to she became semi-violent. She wanted to push me away, get away from me. She kicked at me. Don't try to help me. Then that became -- that's transferred it back into the living

1 room because I've always tried to protect anything 2 from the kids, and they were in our bedroom right 3 there.

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They were not awake. They were not awakened by the incident. We went into the living room where she proceeded to get violent with me and said that she was going to beat the hell out of me for the next two-and-a-half hours until the kids woke up. It was roughly 2:30-ish when this happened:

She proceeded to attack me, tried to hit me, scratch, pull, all that. At that time I tried to defend myself, get away, grabbed my cell phone which was charging, and I went out the front door, got in our car, drove to the Kroger, which is roughly three or four blocks down Abbott Martin.

And on the way I immediately called her father just to let him know what had just happened, and that she had escalated, and that she had threatened suicide many times in the past, but had never carried anything out to the point of making it look like she had done it or tried it or --
