Dr. Donna Beallis Interview

On September 25, 2025 at 10:00 am, I Sgt. Todd Curry met with Sebastian County Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Kyra Jenner at the prosecutor's office in Fort Smith, Arkansas. Present at this meeting was Dr. Donna Beallis. I was asked by Prosecutor Jenner to come to this meeting and record the conversation she scheduled with Dr. Beallis. The following is a transcript of audio recording of that interview.

Donna Beallis Interview

KJ: Kyra Jenner, Deputy Prosecuting Attorney

DB: Dr. Donna Beallis

TC: Todd Curry, SCSO

KJ: So, tell me when, if you want to start with the time and

DB: Yeah.

TC: Okay, Todd Curry, Sebastian County Sheriff's Office, 10 a.m. on September the 25th, 2025. I'm here with Dr. Donna Beallis and

KJ: Kyra Jenner with the

KJ: Prosecutor's Office.

KJ: Dr. Beallis, tell us your first and last name.

DB: Donna Beallis.

KJ: And are you employed?

DB: Yes.

KJ: Tell me what your employment is.

DB: I am a Hospitalist at [REDACTED], and I am employed by [REDACTED].

KJ: I've asked you to come here to give information regarding a, your marriage and the events that occurred during your marriage that resulted in violence with Dr. Randy Beallis. Start out by telling us the date of your marriage.

DB: [REDACTED] 1997.

KJ: And where were you married and, uh, what were the circumstances in life you were in, and he was in when you were first married?

DB: We were married on Indian Rocks Beach in Florida which is next to Clearwater and Tampa and at that time we were both third year residents in our family practice residency.

KJ: And where was the medical school that you were attending?

DB: That was the residency.

KJ: Oh, it

DB: So, we met in Chicago College of Osteopathic Medicine and that was in Chicago. We started our internship and residency down at Sun Coast Hospital in Largo, Florida.

KJ: Okay. Thank you for clarifying that.

DB: And we got married during the residency.

KJ: What year did you graduate from medical school?

DB: Redacted

KJ: And when you graduated from medical school, did you know what specialty you wanted to pursue?

DB: Yes, we both had applied for Family Practice.

KJ: Where did you, uh, where did you and Dr. Randy Beallis live soon after you were married?

DB: We purchased a home in Lutz, it's L-U-T-Z, Florida when we started our internship and we got married after we purchased the house.

KJ: Okay. How long did you live in Florida?

DB: Three years.

KJ: And then where did you move to?

DB: Charleston, Illinois.

KJ: Okay. And how long were you in Charleston, Illinois?

DB: Ten years.

KJ: What was the nature of your practice there?

DB: We both did, uh, traditional family practice. We had an office practice, a hospital practice, and we covered for the group on the weekends.

KJ: Okay. How would you describe your marriage up until the time that you moved to Charleston, Illinois?

DB: We'd been married about six months before we moved.

KJ: Okay.

DB: Um, after getting married, it was no different than living together.

KJ: Okay. Did you have children together?

DB: No at that point.

KJ: When in time did you start your family?

DB: My oldest was born Redacted

KJ: And who would that be?

DB: Redacted

KJ: And when was your next child born?

DB: Redacted

KJ: Redacted next child?

DB: Redacted

KJ: Okay. I've asked you to come here to, um, give law enforcement some idea of any violence that you had perpetrated upon you by Dr. Randy Beallis before, during, or after your marriage to him. Can you start by telling me if that occurred?

DB: Yes there was.

KJ: What was the first violent incident that you recall during your period of before being married, during marriage, and after marriage?

DB: The first incident that I recall, and I lived in Illinois, but I don't know what year, all three children were born, he was angry and threw, I think it was a tub of butter or something in the kitchen. It was not directed at me, but that was the first time there was any violence.

KJ: And what was the precipitating factor if you recall?

DB: I don't recall.

KJ: Okay. What was the resolution in your relationship after that event?

DB: Things went on as normal.

KJ: Okay. Was there another event involving intimate violence or family violence?

DB: There was one incident when he was angry with me, and I do not know why, that he shoved me down and kicked my foot. We were living in Charleston at that time. He denied that he kicked me at that time. The kids came running into the room to see if everything was okay, and I don't recall why there was an argument or disagreement at that time.

KJ: Um, were police called on this event?

DB: No.

KJ: Okay. And you don't recall what had sparked his anger?

DB: Not at that time.

KJ: Okay.

DB: It was a long time ago.

KJ: Okay, um, was there a third event?

DB: There was. We were living in the [Redacted] neighborhood.

KJ: And that is here in Fort Smith?

DB: Mhmm. I think it was [Redacted] Possibly. And I was angry with him because he had a gun that he gave to Shawna Ollie because he felt she needed to protect herself and she lived in Oklahoma and took the gun over to Oklahoma. And I was upset with him for putting the children and I and himself at risk by doing that. He got angry with me, and I ended up being shoved against the wall. The other side of the wall was my daughter's bedroom where she was at. She came out of the bedroom to see what happened and I yelled at her and told her to go back in there and close the door.

KJ: Now were you married or had your marriage been dissolved at this point?

DB: We were still married technically.

KJ: Would you be able to correlate that to a year?

DB: Yes. It was in December.

KJ: Yes.

DB: Uh, November or December and it was 2009.

KJ: Now you mentioned the name of Shawna Ollie. What uh, is that, who is that individual?

DB: That is the woman he married one month after the divorce was final.

KJ: So, at the period, uh, this event is going on, uh, your marriage is still intact legally.

DB: Legally intact, yes.

KJ: Are you in the process of separating?

DB: I think it was before I filed for divorce, but I'm not a hundred percent.

KJ: Okay. How did you become to know of the existence of an individual named Shawna Ollie?

DB: He had introduced me to her. I knew who she was.

KJ: Okay. Was she a physician as well?

DB: No, she was the, I think she was the Admissions Liaison at Health South in Fort Smith where he worked.

KJ: Okay, and would you know how to spell the last name of Ollie?

DB: Yes, it's uh, it's associated with Ollie Lumber from Oklahoma. O-L-L-I-E.

KJ: Okay. How did you come to learn that he had provided a gun to her?

DB: He told me.

KJ: Okay, because if I understand you correctly, he was saying that she needed it for some type of protection issue.

DB: Yes.

KJ: Okay. Explain to me how he shoved you against the wall.

DB: It was torso area.

KJ: Okay. Did you have any injuries as a result of him shoving you against the wall?

DB: No.

KJ: Okay. Would you, would it be a fair characterization to say that he shoved you in a very forceful manner?

DB: Oh definitely.

KJ: Yeah. Did it give you a headache or bruising? I know it's hard to _____ bruising back here, but would there have been any injuries that you identified from that?

DB: No, and no, I just, I did not look, nor did I think about taking pictures of anything along those lines at that time.

KJ: Dr. Beallis, from there, was there another event?

DB: Not while he still lived in the house.

KJ: Okay.

DB: There were two occasions, and I know there are police reports on file.

KJ: Yes.

DB: At the Fort Smith PD which would have the dates to substantiate.

KJ: Yes.

DB: I don't know those off the top of my head.

KJ: Yes.

DB: The first time, all three children were in the car and for some reason the back door was open and I don't know if I was handing the kids something, giving them a kiss goodbye, I don't recall what I was doing, but he got angry and threw the car into reverse and slammed on the gas and I was nearly run over by the vehicle.

KJ: As you were, was it on the passenger side or driver side?

DB: I don't recall.

KJ: Okay. But the door was open, and you were standing near the seat of a, of the vehicle with an open door there.

DB: I was standing between the vehicle and the open door.

KJ: Okay. How were you able to get out of that?

DB: I moved backwards as fast as I could.

KJ: Jumped out of the way. Okay. Dr. Beallis, do you recall what it was that he was angry with you about?

DB: No.

KJ: Was there yet another occasion?

DB: There was another incident, um, and this one was different. My son [Redac] was either at the front door or at the window watching, my youngest one, her backpack was in the backseat and I was at the passenger rear door, the door was open, I was reaching in to get her backpack and he got angry with me and I don't know if it was because I was reaching in the car, um, but he did the same thing and put the car in reverse, slammed on the gas, took off. I never did get the backpack. Um, I did call the police at that time, there was another report. I had that evening to go back to his house where he lived in Williamson Place and he left her backpack outside his front door, so I could go get it for her to go to school the next day.

KJ: And this, was your child inside the vehicle when this happened with the backpack?

DB: No, no. All the children were out of the vehicle.

KJ: Okay. And help me understand, you were giving him, you were just trying to retrieve the backpack, so that your child would have the school supplies needed in that backpack or?

DB: Yes.

KJ: Yes.

DB: Yes.

KJ: Are there any other events that are physical acts of violence?

DB: Against me, no. No, there are some against the children, but none against me.

KJ: Would you please tell me about those?

DB: My son just told me this the other day while we were still married and living at Brighton, there was an incident where the middle child and youngest child were chasing each other, I don't know if they were fighting or if they were just playing, um, but they had socks on, and we had wood floors. [Reda] said he ran down the hallway and into the master bedroom because you either had to go to the master bedroom or down another hallway. He went into the master bedroom, and he was standing between the master bedroom, and the desk and Randy was sitting at the desk. [Redacte] came shortly after that. She slipped and hit her head and started crying and when that happened, Ryan said, dad looked at me and he had this look that scared me and I ran into my room and dad proceeded to punch me multiple times, but he never told me that until the other day.

KJ: _____.

DB: Um, there was an incident at a gymnastics meet where he had the children on a Saturday, so I don't know if this was before the divorce was final because he normally did not have children on the weekend, and he had all three kids [Redact] had a meet. It was at the junior high next to Didion. The girls were helping out and assisting with scorekeeping and running and whatever else they were asked to do, and he went up there and told them that it was time to go and him and [Redac] were outside, an [Redacte] had told him that the

meet wasn't over. They still needed to be there, and he got angry, proceeded to wrestle her to the ground to try and take her phone. She ran back inside. Two of the parents from the girls' team who were helping out with the meet witnessed this and told me this after the fact. He ended up leaving and picking the kids up after the meet was over. There is another issue of abandonment. He was upset with Reda, and she was in sixth grade. All three children were at Christ the King. He had the middle and younger child in his vehicle. Reda was the last one to come out. She stated that she saw his vehicle driving out of the parking lot and was running to catch up to him. He rolled down the window and said you did not do whatever and rolled up the window and drove off and left her standing in the parking lot. He did not take her for visitation for approximately six months after that.

KJ: Any other events of physical violence, um, emotional violence, abandonment that would be important for us to know?

DB: I had another one and I lost it, so give me a minute to think.

KJ: Sure, of course.

DB: After his second wife, well technically his third wife.

KJ: Now who is that?

DB: After Shawna passed away, which was the first week of January.

KJ: Of what year?

DB: Um, I think January of 2012 if I'm correct. She passed away. She had a daughter that the kids no longer saw, and my son was very attached to the daughter. He brought Charity around a couple of weeks later. By Spring Break of that year, Charity had moved in. By Memorial Day weekend of that year, they got married. The children and I were not aware of the marriage until after the fact. By maybe October, Charity was moved out.

KJ: Charity was moved out of

DB: Randy's house.

KJ: Randy's residence.

DB: And she had a son Red that Reda and, they were one year difference in age and Redac and Red hang out together and do things. She moved out. He had another girlfriend. Her name was Katie. I don't remember her last name. I don't know if I ever knew it. I know her parents had owned some convenient stores in Van Buren. My children heard that they were going to get married when she was talking on the phone in the vehicle with the children present. After a weekend, their visitation at that time with their dad was Monday through Friday from 3 to 5, so after a weekend, she told them, did dad tell you that we got married over the weekend. And so, the children were having a very difficult time handling that because they had a death, a marriage, a divorce, and another marriage within in twelve months. They were seeing a counselor at that time. I'm trying to remember his name. I know where his office is at, and he had petitioned the court to suspend visitation.

KJ: Randy had?

DB: His visitation with the children was susp, emergently suspended.

KJ: Now, who filed that?

DB: Eddie Christian, Sr.

KJ: Okay. That was your attorney?

DB: That was my attorney.

KJ: I apologize for interrupting.

DB: That's okay. So, at the recommendation of the children, the counselor the children were going to, he requested an emergency suspension of visitation which was granted. They were required to do joint counseling with Debra, I can't remember her last name, with the children and him at one of the counseling sessions, he got up and walked out in the middle of the session and told Debra that he was no longer going to do this and walked out of the counseling session and visitation was suspended ever since then.

KJ: What year would that have been if you?

DB: Shawna, if Shawna died in 2012, that would've been in 2013.

KJ: Okay. Has he seen the children since that event in 2013?

DB: A couple of times. He stopped at the house when I lived in Reata. It was specifically related to [REDACTED] graduating high school.

KJ: What year would that have been?

DB: She graduated high school 2017 and at that point [REDACTED] had tried to reconnect with him. The other two children did not. After a couple of months, she said that she was struggling with nightmares and remembering traumatic events when they were with him and she stopped seeing him.

KJ: In 2017 do you think or?

DB: It would've been the fall, 'cause she went off to college, sometime between, her freshman year sometime.

KJ: Okay. Anything else you can think of, Dr. Beallis that would be helpful to understand the relationship in terms of family violence?

DB: He did have a temper and got angry easily and the children were afraid of that. My son reported when he was going to Christ the King to a teacher that he was afraid of his dad. At that time, the principal called which was Marna Boltuc.

KJ: What was the name?

DB: Marna. M-A-R-N-A. Boltuc. B-O-L-T-U-C.

KJ: Is it B-O-L

DB: T-U-C.

KJ: Okay, Boltuc or

DB: Boltuc.

KJ: Mmhmm.

DB: Um, Marna told me that she was a mandated reporter. She reported it to Fort.

KJ: I'm sorry, let me shut this door so _____.

DB: She reported it to I'm assuming Fort Smith PD. I got a phone call from a Detective Deaton, and she told me that she would like to meet with each of the children individually and I said okay, so she went to Christ the King and met with [REDACTED] and she met with [REDACTED] at Chaffin regarding [REDACTED] concerns. I did not hear back after that as far as whether or not anything that the children stated needed to be investigated further. DHS did not contact me, and I assume it ended with Detective Deaton.

KJ: How old are your children today?

DB: Currently I have 26-, 24-, and 22-year-olds.

KJ: And how are your children today?

DB: Um, they are successful in their careers. My oldest one just changed jobs. She is now working at an allergy clinic as a nurse. She did do cardiothoracic ICU at Children's for three and half years. She has been seeing a counselor on her own for years. [REDACTED] is in his third year of medical school at UAMS, and he intermittently had seen counselors in high school and college when he felt he needed to. And [REDACTED] graduated from college last year. Her initial plans were to go to Spain for a year with a program called NOWCAP, but there were issues with NOWCAP, and the Spanish government and her plans have been cancelled. She is currently accepting a job at Dallas, and she will be moving to Dallas in the next few weeks. So [REDACTED] [REDACTED]. I figure that if they want to tell me, they will, but I don't ask.

KJ: Is there anything else that you feel would be important for me to know in connection with the prosecution of Dr. Randy Beallis?

DB: I feel he is a narcissist. Give me a second and I will

KJ: Yes.

DB: pull up t [Redacted]

KJ: Is that a therapist in Fort Smith?

DB: Yes. He, at the time my children were seeing him, he taught at UAFS, and he had a private practice. Based on conversations I had with [Redacted] it was felt that the children's dad was a narcissist and displayed some of the typical characteristics with his anger, manipulation, revenge, and getting payback. He also could be very charming, convincing, until you made him angry. When there, at some point when [Redacted] my husband at that time, myself, Randy, and Charity, was married to him at that time, we all were required to see a psychologist and undergo testing I assume it was for personality disorders, I do not think that provider is still, he was at [Redacted] I don't think that provider is there anymore. I think his last name was [Redacted]

KJ: And what was the impetus for you all having to undergo that?

DB: I think [Redacted] was hoping that prior to the suspension of visitation that that would be utilized through the courts with relation to the trauma and the stress the children were undergoing.

KJ: Your three children.

DB: My three children.

KJ: Okay. And did that ever take place, that

DB: We all did, we all did the testing. I never saw my results. I don't know if they are in Eddie Christian, Sr.'s records, but before anything happened, the visitation got suspended and I never pursued it.

KJ: Yeah. In the instances that you have given, you know throwing the item of the butter tub, the other instances where clearly he's trying to run you over with the vehicle or knock you to the ground and pushed the other time when he pushed you up against the wall. Is there one main thing that I can cite to the court that runs through all those events?

DB: He refers to it as when, when I would push his buttons and make him angry, I was the reason why he behaved that way.

KJ: To the best of your knowledge, try to remember, what words would he say which were giving that implication that you were pushing his buttons, and you were making him angry?

DB: One time I remember he said, you made me do it and I responded, not verbatim, but I do not, I did not make you do that. That was your choice to behave in that manner. It was not my choice.

KJ: Was there one at many times, there's lots of factors, but is there any overriding factor that caused the end of your marriage?

DB: I filed for divorce after I had one confirmed infidelity and then there was a second one that he denied, but I knew he was, and I filed for divorce.

KJ: Okay. Anything else, Dr. Beallis? That should be included in this report.

DB: I think that's pretty much everything.

KJ: Okay, thank you.

TC: Mmhmm.

McConnell Narrative

09/16/2025

I, Lt McConnell, was provided contact information for Doctor Donna Beallis by the Sebastian County Prosecutor's Office in reference to Doctor Beallis having personal knowledge involving abuse by Randy Beallis, Donna's ex-husband.

I spoke with Ms. Beallis on a recorded phone and asked her about Randy's abuse while she was married to him. I asked Ms. Beallis how long her and Randy were married. She stated they were married from 1997 to 2010. I asked Ms. Beallis if Randy was ever mentally or physically abusive towards her during the duration of their marriage. Ms. Beallis stated there were times during the marriage and also after the marriage that Randy was abusive. I asked Ms. Beallis if she could give me examples of times Randy was abusive and she stated during the marriage Randy shoved her against the wall because he angry with her. She stated her daughter was on the other side of the wall when this happened. She continued by stating Randy would do other things like throw a tub of butter if he was upset. She clarified Randy didn't necessarily throw items at her but just in general because he was angry. Ms. Beallis stated after the divorce there should be two reports on file with Fort Smith Police Department where Randy attempted to run her over with a vehicle. I asked Ms. Beallis if she recalled any incidents where Randy was physically abusive with the children. She stated she recalled a time where the children were in gymnastics and helped out with gymnastic meets. She stated Randy arrived at the meet and told the girls it was time to leave. She stated her daughter told Randy the meet was not over and they still needed to help with the meet. Ms. Beallis stated an altercation ensued which resulted in Randy wrestling her daughter, identified as [REDACTED], to the ground in an attempt to get her cell phone from her. She stated there was no police report filed on this incident. I asked Ms. Beallis if this was the only incident she could recall and she stated she knows the kids are scared of Randy because of his temper. She continued by stating when her son was in 5th or 6th grade he told his teacher that he was afraid of Randy. She stated the principal called her and told her she would have to report this to the police. She said a detective from Fort Smith Police Department met with both kids and interviewed them but she did not know the contents of those conversations. I asked Ms. Beallis if this type of behavior was exhibited by Randy during the entire duration of the marriage and she stated no it did not start that way in the beginning. Ms. Beallis stated there was never any choking or hitting during the marriage that she could recall. I asked Ms. Beallis if the incidents where Randy attempted to run her over were close together or isolated and she stated she could not recall. She stated she knows the children were in the car with Randy on one of the occasions. Ms. Beallis stated she went to Dan Shue about the incidents and was told it was a case of "he said she said" so no charges were filed. After a brief conversation with Ms. Beallis the phone conversation was terminated.

I requested a copy of all police reports from Fort Smith Police Department involving Randy Beallis. Once I have those reports I will be taking this report, the Fort Smith Police reports, and a recording of the phone conversation to the Prosecuting Attorney's Office.
